"We're feeling mixed about leaving it, there's a lovely feel to this house which is the reason we bought it and we have loads of memories here but it's time to move on to chapters

The garden transformation began 25 years ago after the bar and BBQ area which now houses a hot tub were built to keep them dry while watching the fireworks on one of their daughters' birthday three days before Bonfire Night in November.

It was also ideal for other winter celebrations including their other daughter, Mhairi's birthday in February when she was growing up.

Harry Kiernan, now 73, built the bar largely by himself but with some help from his future son-in-law for just £2 and said: "It's the end of an era, we've had a wedding party in that garden. Now it's on to the next chapter of our lives.'

## Fossil is named after Finnish rock singer

A NEW fossil species has been named after a heavy metal

species of Cretaceous brittle star was named in honour of Floor Jansen, the 39-vear-old Dutch with Finnish heavy rock band Nightwish.

Palaeontologists from the Natural History Museums in Luxembourg and Maastricht discovered the previously discovered the previously unknown species of brittle star that lived in the shallow, warm sea which covered parts of the

present-day Netherlands at the end of the Dinosaur Era.

The starfish-like creature was unearthed more than 20 years ago, but has only now been identified as new to science.

The name of the new fossil pays tribute to metal vocalist Jansen, in recognition of the "mutual inspiration" between science and music.

The new fossil species had long passed unnoticed. It was a stroke of luck when a fossil collector noted the fossil of a tiny, starfish-like creature during one of his excursions to the world-famous ENCI Heidelberg Cement company quarry near the Dutch city of Maastricht.

The specimen was much smaller than other brittle-star fossils occasionally found at the same locality, and so much less likely to be collected.

Dr John Jagt, palaeontologist at the Natural History Museum in Maastricht, soon identified the specimen as a long-spined brittle-star.
